PRESIDENT ON PILGRIMMAGE TO TEMPLES

The president of QSA Reverend James Wilson is proceeding with the building relationships and rapport with individual temples and the members of the Sangha by visiting them and

discussing matters of common interest. The article on the Bodhi Chan Meditation Center in Springwood is a sequel to one of his recent pilgrimages.

BODHI CHAN MEDITATION CENTER IN SPRINGWOOD

In July, on a sunny winter's day I visited the Bodhi Chan Meditation Center. It was established in 2012 and is situated in a leafy part of Springwood (223 Dennis Rd, Springwood, Queensland 4127).

The first thing I noticed when passing through the gate were the wallabies and the tall Gum Trees. Going further I came to the main building which is framed by huge outcrops of black sandstone on the hill behind. This natural bush setting is very conducive to meditation and here and there amongst the trees are small levelled spaces. In these spaces a small tent and a chair are provided to allow people to meditate quietly and in isolation.

As well as meditation, Venerable Hui Chyuan, the resident monk, offers classes in Buddhism and Tai Chi. These classes are held every Saturday and are conducted in English. On Fridays the Dharma talk is in Chinese. In this way, Venerable Hui Chyuan hopes to promote Buddhism to Chinese and non-Chinese alike.

In addition, while his teachings follow the Chan tradition he presents Buddhism in a non-sectarian way. His ultimate objective is "to foster good health, ethical living, mindfulness, stillness, kindness, insight and freedom of the heart".

According to Ven Hui Chyuan Bodhi Chan is dedicated to the flourishing of the Dharma for the benefit of individuals and societies for a long time to come and he looks forward to further developing its programmes and facilities to this end.

PROPOSAL TO HOLD AN ANNUAL BUDDHIST CONVOCATION OF QUEENSLAND

INTRODUCTION

Since the setting up of the Chinese Temple in Breakfast Creek about forty years ago, a series of Buddhist organisations, mostly temples, monasteries, nunneries and Buddhist associations have been set up in Queensland. Central service organisations such as the Buddhist Council of Queensland (1998), the Buddhist Education Services for Schools (BESS) (2006) and the Queensland Sangha Association (2007) were set up as a necessary sequel.

Many volunteer lay persons have made major sacrifices in establishing these organisations, especially the temples. Because of the establishment of these facilities, many monks and nuns have begun to reside in these institutions and serve the community for so many years.

However no attempt has been made to give appropriate recognition to any of these individuals. It is expected that an annual Buddhist convocation and public appreciation would provide an impetus to all Buddhist communities and encourage future generations to render even more voluntary and meritorious services.

Such an event can be organised with political and government participation centrally once per year and extended to each institution with the leadership of the QSA, when those institutions are interested and capable to do so.

The example set up in Queensland is likely to be followed in other states and territories for the good of the Buddhist dispensation in Australia.

HOW A BUDDHIST CONVOCATION CAN BE HELD

The central organisations such as QSA, BCQ, and BESS can meet and draw up a method of instituting a common Buddhist convocation. For example a suitable venue and time for a Buddhist gathering of an estimated 20 monks and nuns and say 50 lay people from all Buddhist centres and all the central service organisations can be selected. When publicity is given if larger numbers

are attending the venue might have to be changed to suit numbers. October first week is considered to be a suitable time for a convocation day before Theravada temples get busy with the annual robes ceremonies.

- 2 Government officials and a suitable political figure can be invited as honoured guests. All Buddhist associations, temples etc. need to be invited.
- 3 All members of the sangha and all lay persons recommended by each institution can be given a document of honour or a memento for their services. In addition valuable presents also can be given if that is feasible.
- 4 Publicity through the media needs to be organised to the extent possible. Publicity can also be organised by the central service organisations using their mailing lists and websites.

HOW A BUDDHIST CONVOCATION CAN BE EXTENDED TO ALL TEMPLES

- Individual associations may emulate the event and a similar event of their own can be held to coincide with a major event in that association. For example a temple may conduct and honours day to coincide with (a) a January 1 festival (b) a traditional new-year festival, (c) a Vesak festival (d) a robes giving festival or such other festivals when large numbers of people gather together.
- 2 QSA may participate in such functions when invited by the individual associations.
